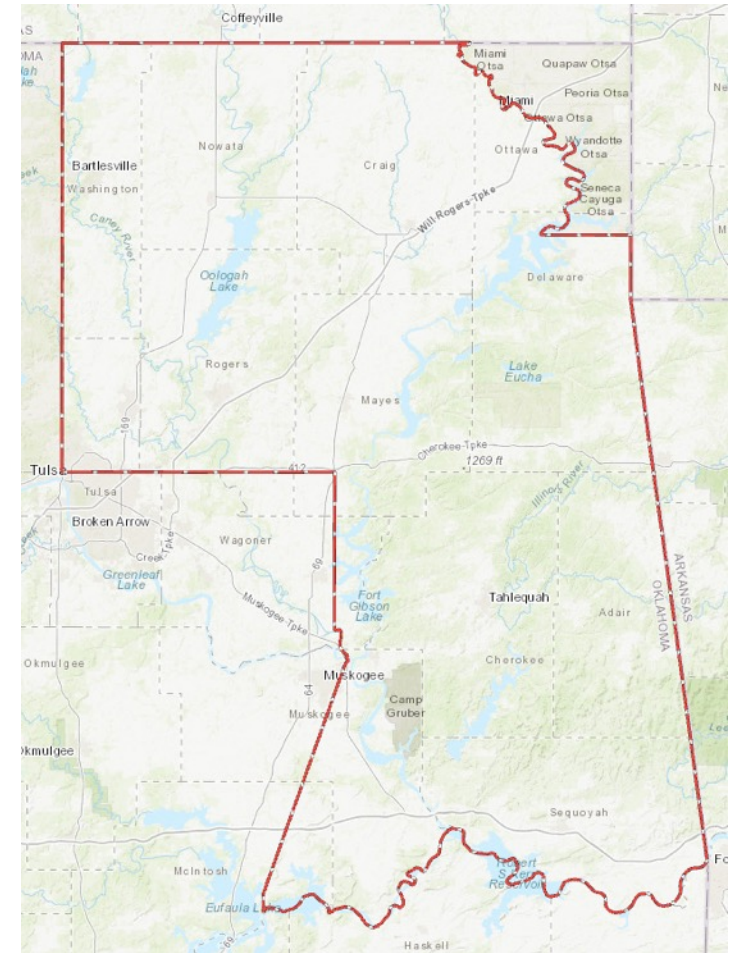
Cherokee Nation

 - \$500,000





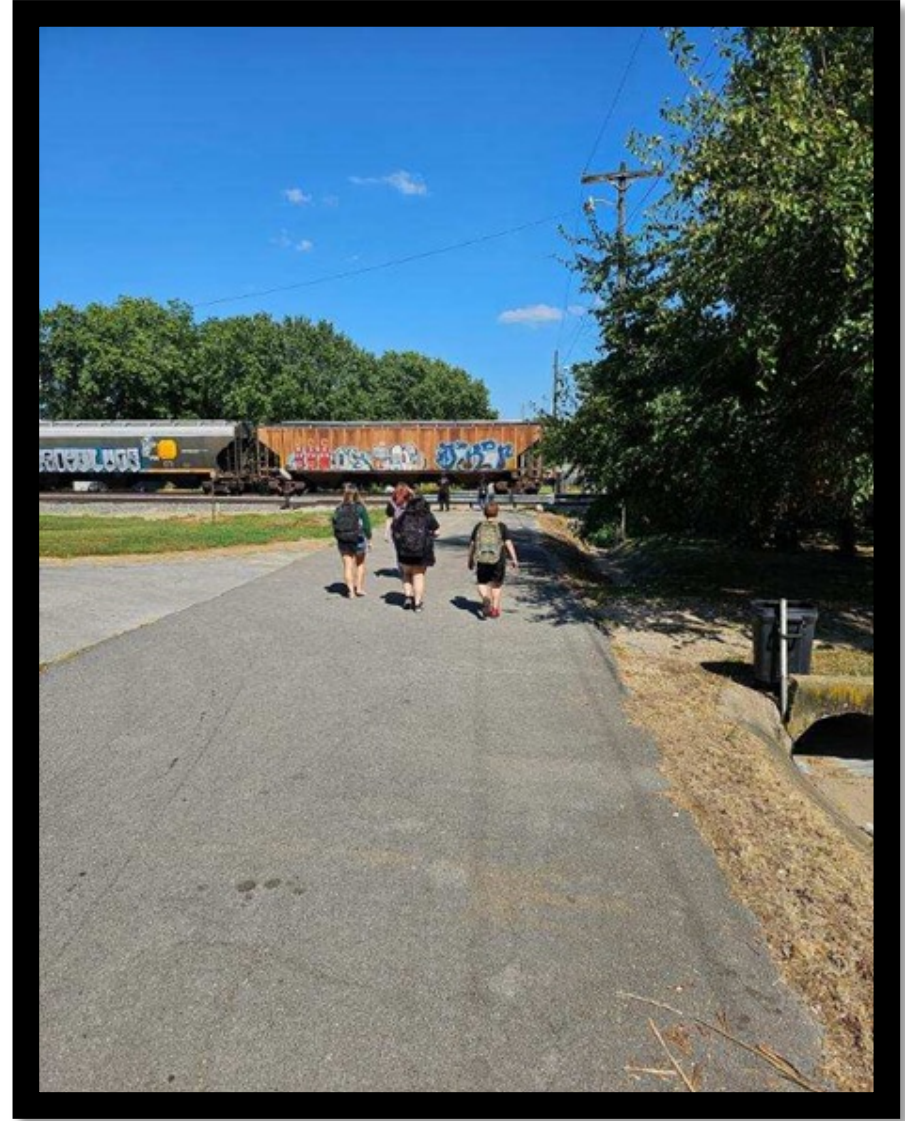
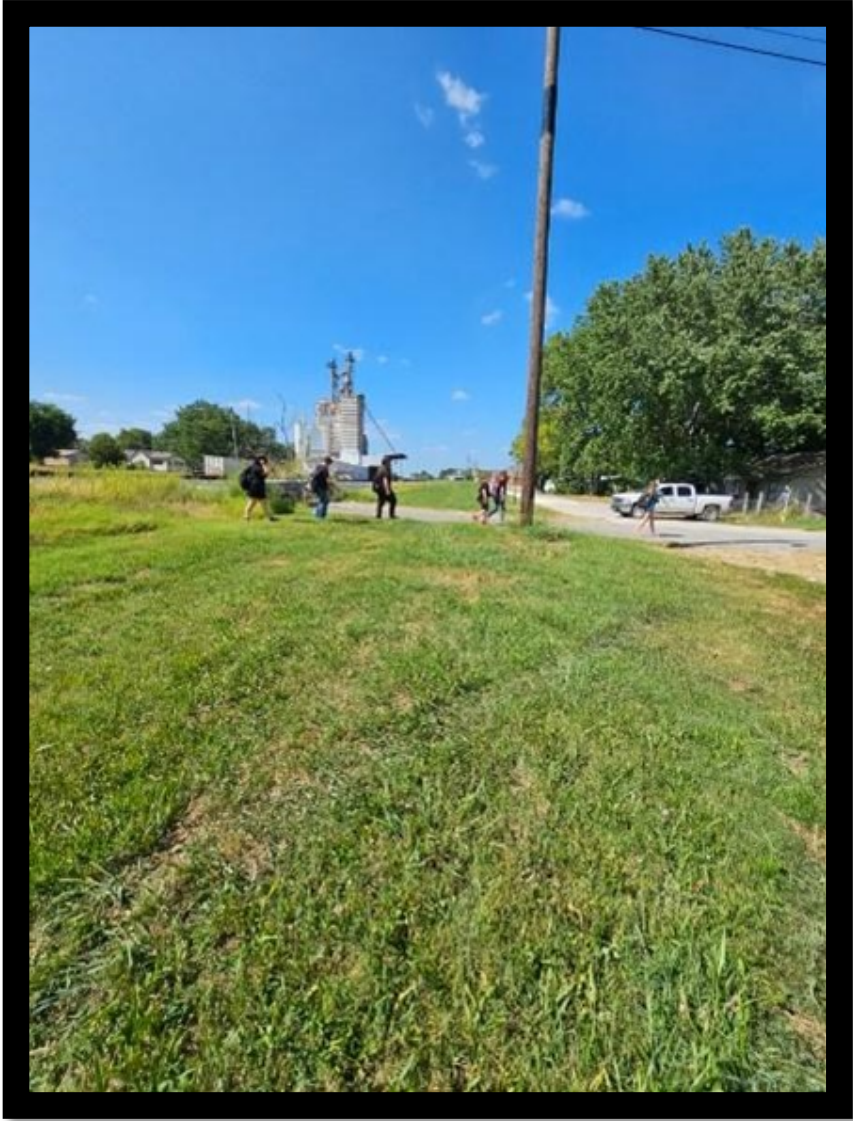

- Listening to students, families, teachers, and school leaders and working with existing community organizations, and build intentional, ongoing engagement opportunities into the program structure.



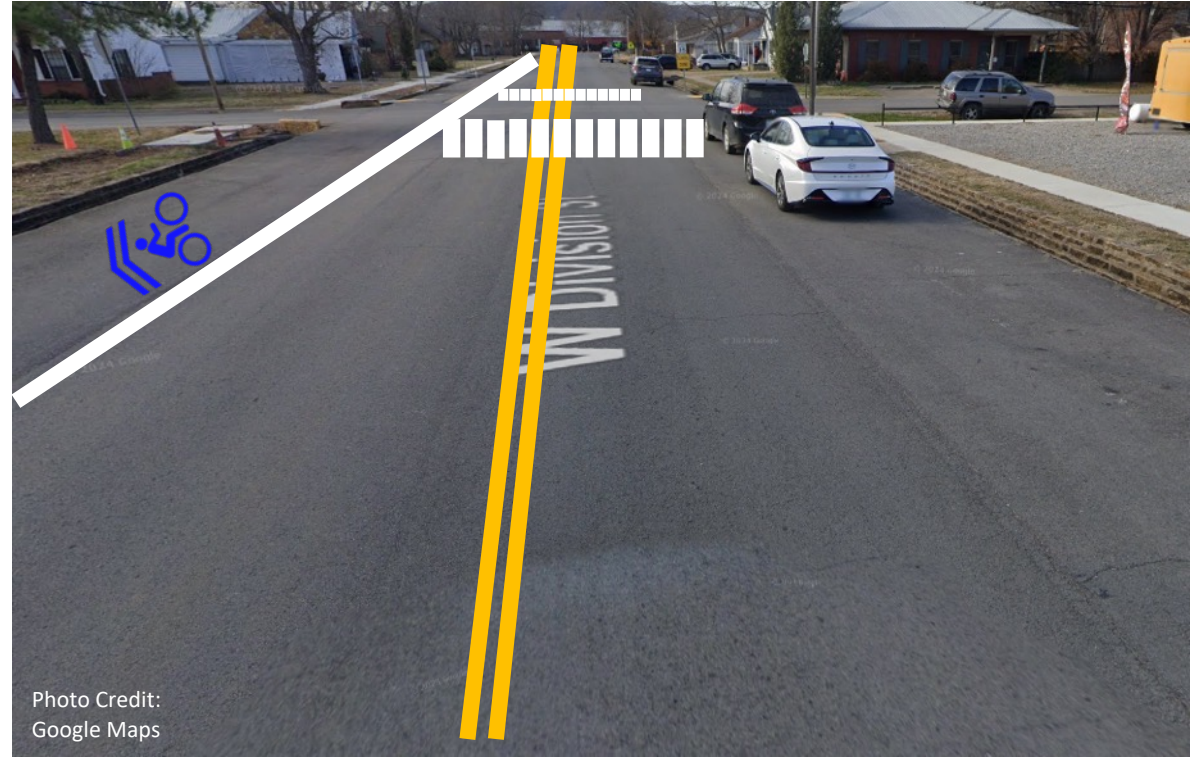
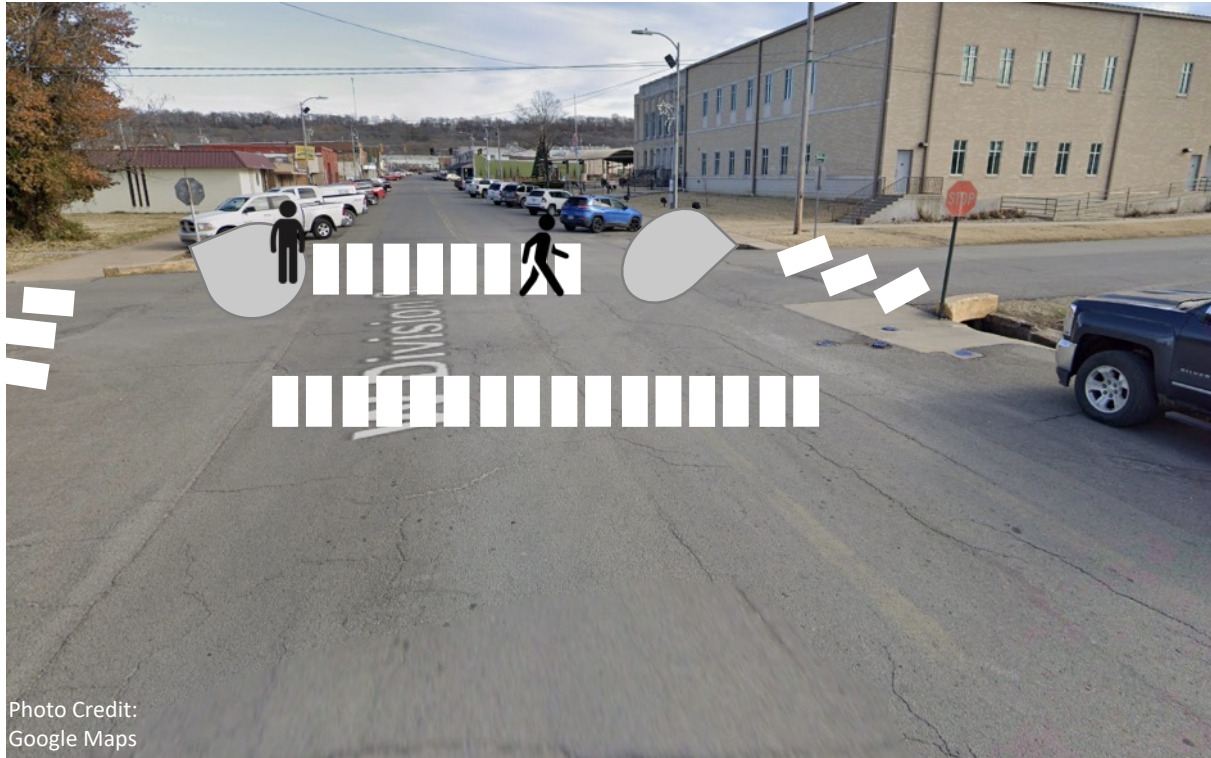

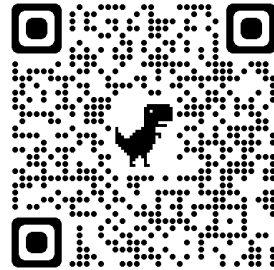
