







# AARP Community Challenge

A grant program to make communities *more livable* for people *of all ages* with tangible improvements that jump-start long-term change



# Impacts

- ✓ **BENEFITING PEOPLE 50+:** We estimate that 12M people 50+ have benefited,10% of the U.S. 50+ population.
- ✓ INSTALLING PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS: Created 45,000 tangible improvements and 8,000 resources.
- ✓ ATTRACTING FUNDING: 50% of grantees have garnered additional funds, attracting an additional \$23.6 million.
- ✓ OVERCOMING BARRIERS: 87% have overcome policy barriers.
- ✓ INCREASING AWARENESS: 100% have seen greater awareness and engagement in their efforts.
- ✓ ENGAGING VOLUNTEERS: Over 40,000 volunteers have participated in grant-funded projects.




# Creating More Walkable Communities



- Delivering transportation and mobility options that increase connectivity, walkability, bikeability and access to public and private transit
  - √ 500 crosswalks and sidewalks improved
  - √ 200 artistic crosswalks installed
  - √ 300 traffic calming interventions created
- Implementing walk audit assessments to enhance safety and walkability in communities
  - √ 300 walk audits completed
- Enhancing pedestrian safety by creating safer streets and sidewalks with funding support from Toyota Motor North America.
  - √ 500 tangible improvements implemented


